Stirrings From Susan

God's salvation story, the story of God reconciling all things to God's very self; redeeming and restoring the fallen creation from sin's bondage and power, is strange from beginning to end! The Hebrew story calls forth old men and women to bring forth a new people; and a murderer to lead a people to freedom; and an adulterous king to form a nation. In the New Testament. the salvation history continues - an illegitimate birth; a roaming itinerant preacher and teacher, killed on a cross as a common criminal and an empty tomb. This is not how we'd write the story if it were up to us.

It doesn't make sense to us. We prefer a less challenging way. We don't want anyone to suffer. And yet the story of suffering is the story of humanity under the weight and burden of sin. God undoes, breaks

through, destroys not only sin's power through the gift of grace and forgiveness, but destroys even death's power. The darkness of the tomb is filled with light. The nature of life itself undergoes a reorientation and the rhythms of the universe are transformed forever. Redemption is all encompassing and the justice of heaven reigns. Amazing love. Amazing grace. Amazing life!

Too often, we try to get to resurrection without traveling to the cross. In order to 'experience and see' new life, we must travel through the shadows of the valley of death; out onto the wastelands of Golgotha, where the powers and principalities seemed to have won once The journey through Lent again. continues as we move towards Easter the church and deepens its understanding in what it will cost to be a follower of the Way. We begin to see how much will have to die, even in us, for the light to grow. Holy Week moves us quickly, as if through a birthing canal, from the story of life and death and death to new life. As Ann Weems reminds us in her poem - "Holy is the Week,", 'it is time for preparation. The time to give thanks and drink the cup is upon us....Eat, drink and remember. On this day, each of us must ask, "Is it I?" And on that darkest of days, each of us must stand beneath the tree and watch the dying if we are to be there when the stone is rolled away. to Easter is through the unrelenting shadows of that Friday. Only then will the alleluias be sun, only then will the dancing begin.'

We believe in resurrection. Not only on some distant shore, but in the midst of the world's brokenness. In the midst of the struggle our patient waiting breaks out into new possibilities, new opportunities, new growth, new beginnings! There will be several opportunities to deepen your own walk of faith in the midst of the community of faith. Come, join us.

You are invited to join us for the Journey Through Holy Week:

Palm Sunday – We, Christ's disciples, join the throng entering the city of Jerusalem, entering through the ancient gates to enter once more into the unfolding story of Jesus' last days before his crucifixion. We enter the sanctuary carrying the Palms with all the excitement and anticipation of those who followed Jesus. On this Palm Sunday, we will also share in Communion.

Maundy Thursday – Come and join the community as we gather at tables to remember God's saving activity through the Seder Meal. Smell the lamb cooking over fire, taste the bitter herbs, hold the cup, hear the ancient story. The meal begins at 6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.

Good Friday – We gather on Friday evening, at 7 p.m., under the shadow of the cross, to join our choir and reader in a moving retelling through word and music of Christ's last days. The Tenebrae Service, "It Is Finished" by Mary McDonald draws us into the wondrous love of God and the mystery of God's suffering love. Other instrumentalists will join the choir in this presentation. Friends, community members, family members are warmly welcomed.

Easter Sunday – Two services will be held on Easter – the first at 7:30 a.m., followed by an Easter breakfast sponsored by our Christian Nurture and Fellowship committee. Come and celebrate the good news that death cannot overcome God's love and God's resurrection power! A second service will be held at 10 a.m. and will include the Sacrament of Holy Communion. All are welcome!

Did You Know ...

...that Trinity operated a parochial school system for many years? The congregation considered a Christian education in the German language to be important and started a parochial school in the church basement in 1872 (three years after its founding). Trinity held school classes during the week for the children in the community. Many members of the church sent their children to the Trinity school, even though the Marcy and Fairview schools were closer to their homes. At times, the pastor taught the school, and at other times teachers were hired. Also, a constitution was adopted for the school, and a school board elected during one period. The teacher's salaries consisted of the fees that were paid by the pupils and free board or a set salary. The salary paid to a teacher was \$35.00 a month in 1880. For this pay, the teacher was also required to lead the choir. The fees the children paid varied from 25 cents a week, or 25 to 50 cents a month, or \$1.50 a year. Every third child in each family was admitted free. The use of the English language (instead of German) was first permitted in 1880 when English translations and the teaching of geography in English were allowed.

A small schoolhouse was built in back of the northwest corner of the church in 1888 at a cost of \$800.00. The Trinity parochial school was in operation until 1921. The schoolhouse was moved a short distance north and made into a stage. The schoolhouse continued to be used for Sunday School and other meetings until the Fellowship Hall was built in 1934-35. Sunday School remained as the primary means of giving the youth of the community a Christian education after 1921. Classes were provided for children of kindergarten age to those in the confirmation class. The number of classes depended on the enrollment and the number of teachers available. Information on the enrollment in the early years is not available, but was probably guite high based on the size of many of the confirmation classes .

At that time-23 in 18888, 10 in 1898, 16 in 1908, 16 in 1918, 11 in 1928, and 7 in 1938. During the late 1940's and into the 1950's, the population explosion in the eastern part of Waukesha County put a real strain on the public school system facilities. As a result, Fairview School (Brookfield) and Marcy School (Menomonee Falls) used Trinity's old Fellowship Hall for classes while new facilities at those schools were planned and built. In addition, Fairview, Dixon, Hillside, and Cottage schools used old Fellowship Hall for graduation programs and other special events.

Trinity still sits in the middle of a growing community, where periodically various age groups could be looking for temporary accommodations in the future.

Trinity Dartball 2018–2019 Season Recap – League Champs!

Trinity's Dartball Team was again crowned League Champion for the second year in a row. In a very competitive season, any one of the four league teams could have been the champion right up to the end of the season. Trinity won 21 games, lost 15 games, and tied 6 games (tie games happen when both teams are still tied at the end of 12 innings). Trinity finished 3 ½ games ahead of

Calvary, 4 games ahead of Greendale, and 4 ½ games ahead of Christ.

Individual accomplishments were many. Eric Dahm led our team and league in batting average (.477), led our team and league in hits (72), led our team and league in total bases (102), and led our team and league in runs scored (29). Dave Mielke led our team and league in runs-batted-in (30), and led our team and league in most improved batting average (.093). Mark Burbey was our third player batting over .300 (.302), and was second on our team with 16 triples and 19 runs-batted-in. Meredith Lang, for the second year in a row, led our team and league in triples with 25. Newcomer, Jim Singleton was a welcome addition driving in 14 runs. Peter Grob had double digit numbers in both runs scored (12) and runs-batted-in (12). Dan Dierbeck was first on the team and second in the league with 6 doubles and Kathy Immekus was second on the team and third in the league with 5 doubles. Kathy Leslie got on base and had 13 runs scored. Other supporting cast members on Trinity's team included Kathryn Dierbeck, Bob Rohrig, Jean Schuster, and Ralph Zahn. Ralph went on the injured reserve list early in the season and Jean went on the injured reserve list late in the season. Overall it was a fun filled competitive season and we all had our ups and downs – some more than others.
