

Many of you wonder what is happening with your church profile! Worship is often so full that we don't have time to talk about it much. Just a recap may be helpful!

- 1. The Search committee sent out a survey and many of you took the time to respond. Thank you! Last fall, Emily Dahm and Ralph Zahn shared the results of those surveys immediately following worship. There are still copies of that report available and as Ralph said then, he is available for any follow-up questions folks may still have.
- 2. A decision was made by the Search Committee to engage in some transitional 'study' work to assist them with completing the profile. The format of the profile is quite different than previously.
- 3. From January through March we have held search retreat sessions. All members were invited to come to these gatherings. Many of you have been involved! Thank you! The first session dealt with the question of 'who are we,' and as we worked, an image began to appear as to the identity of Trinity at this time. The next sessions, one which was on a Saturday, from 9:30 2 involved the Biblical perspective about church and was called "God's Vision, Christ's Mission" and the second half of the day was spent learning about the changing world around us 'Who Is Our Neighbor'. The basic uptick of that day was that 'everything

Did You Know ...

...who **die Frauenverein** were? This was a German name that was used for ladies benevolent associations that were organized and operated within German speaking Protestant churches in the United States in the 1800's and early 1900's. These groups of ladies were very active working within the church and doing outreach mission work.

Trinity's Frauenverein group was first organized in 1901 with 16 ladies who initially met at the parsonage (Trinity House) at the invitation of Rev. Gustav Klein. Membership in Trinity's Frauenverein grew to fourty members by 1907. The ladies in this group raised money by organizing suppers, socials, bazaars, plays, and collecting member dues. As their membership grew, space to hold meetings became a problem. Sometimes the meetings were held in member homes and sometimes in the school house. Member dues would be paid after church services or wherever a member might happen to meet the treasurer, who usually carried her record book with her. Some of the internal projects that these ladies helped pay for included the art glass windows in the church, a bath in the parsonage, church decorations, a kitchen in the schoolroom, and lights in the church and parsonage. They also kept the parsonage clean. By the 1920's, as English replaced the German language in the congregation, the die Frauenverein name was changed to Ladies Aid Society. Outreach continued to consist of work in hospitals, mission homes, various institutions, and visiting the sick. Sewing items for children in need and the elderly also occupied much of their time. Their monthly business meetings that included time for cake and tortes refreshments and getting updates on family news was a welcome break in the routine of these women, most of whom were farm wives.

In 1940, the Ladies Aid Society name was changed to Women's Guild and six department chairs were formed – Christian Education, Spiritual Life, Missionary, Social Action, Stewardship, and Christian Service. The Guild continued their support of hospitals, mission houses, and other institutions. During World War II, the Guild sewed clothes and donated canned fruits and vegetables for the needy, sent toys and gifts to the children in the Japanese-American internment camps in Utah, and several hundred pounds of clothes to Europe from 1944 to 1948. The opportunities for service by the women of the congregation grew as the church membership increased in the 1950's and beyond. In 1956, the Guild branched out into afternoon and evening circles. In 1975, the name of the Women's Guild was changed to Women's Fellowship. However, by this time the nature of Trinity's mission activities had started to change. More women church members had entered the work force and were not as readily available for daytime or nighttime mission activities. On a positive note, many of Trinity's male members who did become available helped out on many of Trinity's mission activities, and thus various mission activities has continued to be an important focus of Trinity Church to this day.





Summer Services Look for a Change

Everyone anticipates summer – for travel, outdoor recreation, gardening, and its more relaxed pace. Just as our choir and Sunday School take time off during the summer, we are going to experiment with giving our ushers some time off too.

During June, July and August, we are going to schedule two ushers instead of four during Sunday services. There will still be a designated head usher and one assistant to oversee our worship. So, there will still be someone to greet you and offer you a bulletin. There will still be someone to pass the microphone to those who have a prayer concern or an announcement to share. There will still be someone to count attendance and assist with any other questions that come up during the service.

Where will we see the greatest change? In giving our offerings. This is where we are asking all of our members to participate a little more and help make sure the offering plates are passed around. Our two ushers will

come down the center aisle to the front and begin by giving the plates to those sitting near the center. Then, if there are just a few people in a pew, the plate can be returned back to the usher. If a pew is more full, we would like a person near the end of the pew to pass the plate to a row behind. The ushers will always be in the he process and the plate can always be passed back to them. There is no wrong way to do this.

What this requires of us is simply to pay some attention to each another and the experience. If you see that someone might be unable to easily turn around or get up to pass the plate to a row behind - please help. Of course, we can always choose to sit closer together to aid the process too! And, who knows, maybe this experience will stir some confidence or interest in you to become an usher or other volunteer during our worship time.

We will do a 'dry run' of this experiment at our outdoor worship the first Sunday in June. We are thinking that if Jesus' twelve disciples could depend on five thousand followers to make sure that everyone got some bread and fish, we can certainly help the ushers collect our offerings!

Please feel free to talk with me if you have any questions or comments as we run our experiment.

that 'everything has changed.' The culture that you and I grew up in, is now long gone. We are living into a new day. We need adaptive answers, which are much different than 'technical fixes'. The third retreat was around the church's 'Core Values' and that discussion was energizing and began to set a direction for where we are heading as a church. They are: Acceptance, Spirituality, Community and Mission.

- 4. And now, there are two retreats left! You don't need to have attended any of the past retreats to be a part of these. In fact, at every retreat, we have had new people join us for these conversations. We'd love to have your voice represented as well!
- 5. Sunday, April 28th, the Reverend Franz Rigert, our Wisconsin Conference Minister will be with us for worship and stay with us to be a part of our fourth retreat. The crux of this conversation will be 'who is our neighbor' and we look forward to hearing from him, some of the creative ministries that are emerging among the churches of our conference. He is open for Q & A and we'll allow plenty of time for any questions you might have.
- 6. The final retreat is scheduled for Sunday, May 5th. The task at hand will be to take our four core values and create some 'central statement' that we will use to direct and guide our process of planning and setting goals and in worship. Some dreaming about our future will also be involved.
- 7. If you have any questions about this process, please speak with your Search Committee or any of the many other folks who have joined them at these retreats. The hope is that as we finish the last retreat, your team will be ready to write the profile and have it looked at by our conference folks. They have not set a date yet for submission, but we are drawing nearer to that time! - **Pastor Susan**
