Stirrings From Susan

As I get a little more 'planted' in this place, I grow ever more excited about the work we are called to do together. I've enjoyed my few brief weeks at Trinity and can see many strengths among you and the ministry to which you have been called.

My time, as 'intentional interim' is meant to help you become ready to receive a new pastor within the coming months. In fact, this work, of 'intentionality' has been what I've been doing throughout my years of ministry and this is in many ways an extension of that work.

Yesterday, I spent time with other intentional interims in Baraboo, WI, having conversations about this work. It's a 9 month program and will arrive at a fortuitous moment for me as I begin working with you. There are, it turns out two kinds of intentional interims. Some have been simply

'maintenance' ministers, not really assessing needs or challenging towards growth. What is an intentional interim? How is that different from maintenance?

The congregation, during this time of transition has several questions that it needs to begin asking. It has perhaps even more work to do than in any other time of its life, when things return to a sort of 'status quo' - at least for a few vears. Besides dealing with the inevitable conflicts that occur when change occurs, and the grief – not only for your last pastor, Jan, but also around other issues that the church has had to go through, are central tasks of this time. To be ready to receive a new pastor, healing is required. But then there are other questions, and these are incredibly important for churches in this time -'Who are we? What is our purpose? What is God calling us to do and be? In order to do this, we will need to become 'explorers' - exploring our heritage and history; rediscovering the core values that shape us; exploring our communities and the neighbors around us. There is much exciting and challenging work to be done.

We are also working alongside our Search Committee and after the meeting yesterday, I see new ways that I can support them. The new profile is a challenging document.

The interim allows for work within the leadership teams, and to equip lay leaders with new skills. It is a time to

rework old personnel policies and perhaps re-imagine the organizational style of the church. It explores how it might better engage and connect with the denomination, the community, the interfaith networks, the city of Milwaukee. Here, it will involve settling some differences about moving ahead with the new needs of the building.

A cautionary word. It is easy to get caught up in focusing on the building. In fact, that's where many churches are focusing their energy. But alongside and perhaps even before that, we must rediscover both our mission and our ministry. We must deepen our own spiritual practices and begin to be a community deepened by prayer and study of God's Word and committing ourselves to grow in spiritual maturity.

As you can perhaps see, these tasks are not the usual tasks of a pastor. I will not be able to attend every committee meeting or every event. I will be relying on other lay people to pick up the pastoral care that our church so desperately needs. I will probably not be out in the community, going to games and concerts of our youth, in order to build relationships with them. I won't attend every denominational event. I will be more focused and intentional in our work together, but I know that I will get to know you much better in this time. This work must be collaborative – both between you and I and you and one another. We must work together as a team.

I will be present with you. I will bring my pastoral skills to you as often as needed, I will care for you and listen. I hope that this helps you get a better grasp of the work we will be doing together.

Finally, let me add, that I am here with you for a short period of time. I have agreed not to be considered as your future pastor. I promise to remain clear about those boundaries. I am hopeful that this also leaves you with a sense of urgency about the work that needs to be done! Our goal – to get you ready to welcome a new pastor with open arms and ready to work alongside of her or him in new ways! May God bless our work.

Did You Know ...



...what important one word activity in all churches is least likely to generate enthusiasm and enjoyment? It's most likely the

word stewardship.

Dealing with this activity has challenged churches for a long time. Various stewardship programs have been tried, like public printing of individual's giving, or dividing total budget equally by number of members/ households, etc., and the results also varied.

It's interesting to look back and see the various ways that Trinity church members were asked to support their church. In the very earliest days, each family was assessed a specific standard amount (dues) for the year (with a few exceptions for single persons or very poor families). However, church expenses in those days are really not comparable to today, since the pastor's and organist's salaries were minimal, and the members of the church did almost all of the building and maintenance work that was required.

A variable assessment system was initiated around the First World War (see below). In addition, during the first half of the 1900's, the ladies in the church cooked and baked for picnics, mission fests, and chicken suppers, and this accounted for a significant portion of the church's annual income. The pledge system (where members make individual pledge decisions) and the "faith" system (where it is assumed that enough money will be contributed to pay the bills) are more recent giving programs that may or may not work.

The variable assessment system was initiated by Rev. Bratzel (served Trinity 1915-1918) was spelled out in his personal letter to Trinity for our 100th Anniversary celebration. He states "I had to revise their money system to get them out of the red. They had taken the total amount of expenses and divided it by number of members and the answer was about \$7 per member, but not all members would pay the \$7 so there was a shortage. I was sure that some could pay more than \$7 per year, so we made the membership of three classes. An \$8 class for widows and poor families. A \$12 class for the average family, and a \$15 class for those who had some wealth beyond average. It made quite a change in results for most of them avoided the \$8 class and went for the 12 & 15 dollar class, and when joined church he signed up for \$20 and brought quite a stir among the board members who thought he couldn't do that. From there on the financial status was improved."

An interesting concept. Would it work today? Probably not, but it does provide some food for thought. - **Bob Rohríg**



The Outdoor Ministry Programs of Wisconsin Conference United Church of Christ

at Moon Beach and Pilgrim Center have provided sacred space for thousands of children, adults and families to gather, celebrate and grow in the faith for many years. Your investment in this Campital Campaign will improve, build and grow our ministry in the future.

In 2015, Trinity pledged \$10,000 over a three-year span to help with the rebuilding efforts of the Outdoor Ministry.

- 2015 we submitted a check for \$3,333
- > 2016 we submitted a check for \$2,958.00
- > 2017 we submitted a check for \$1,515.00

Trinity currently received an invoice for the remaining \$2,192.72.
