Jesus' earliest followers were called people of the Way. To be a Christian often means to follow a certain set of beliefs. To be a people of the WAY, means to walk by faith through grace in God's Ways. Neighbors in Need Helps make a "A Just World for All" Possible

Thank you for supporting Neighbors in Need! This annual offering supports UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Our offering is October 6.

- ➤ Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.
- ➤ One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM).

Through <u>ucc.org/justice</u>, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news update, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as:

- ➤ The Federal Budget
- Voting Rights
- ➤ Immigration

- ➤ Health Care
- ➤ Hate Crimes
- ➤ Civil Liberties

➤ Environmental Justice

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandran, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribe UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

long it took to build our current church from the time Trinity's congregation approved building a new church, to the completion of construction?

Well, it took considerably longer than the ten months it took to plan, purchase, design, and build our first church back in 1869 -1870. The 1950's were an exciting time at Trinity. Milwaukee families began expanding rapidly westward. The post-war housing boom was in full swing. Subdivisions were springing up in all directions from Trinity. Families from diverse church and ethnic backgrounds were swelling our membership rolls. Membership increased from 178 in 1950 to 407 in 1959. There were over 200 children ages one to sixteen in the church in 1959. And our original church facilities were bursting at the seams.

- ➤ In January 1956, the Congregation approved the formation of a Study Committee, a Finance Committee, and a Building Committee to study whether a new church should be built.
- ➤ In June 1956, the Congregation turned down (by one vote), a proposal to build a new church at a cost of approximately \$190,000.
- ➤ In September 1956, the Congregation authorized the Building Committee to start a Building Fund campaign and engage the services of an Architect.
- ➤ In October 1956, the Congregation approved (by nine votes), the Building Committee's rec-

ommendation to build a new church on our present site. The Building Fund Drive started in 1956, with a goal of \$50,000, but an Architect wasn't hired until May 1958.

- ➤ In November 1958, the Congregation approved the new church building plans/sketches presented by the Architect.
- ➤ In 1959, construction of the new church building was on hold until the Building Fund goal of \$50,000 was reached (which happened at the end of 1959).
- ➤ In January 1960, the Congregation approved negotiating a bank loan for up to \$100,000 for construction of a new church building.
- ➤ Finally, on March 27, 1960, the groundbreaking ceremony to start building the new church was held. However, the new building project got off to a slow start.
- ➤ After the groundbreaking ceremony, April and May rains held up new construction almost completely. By June, only the

concrete footings reinforced with steel rods and the drain tiles were in place. But after that point, construction work proceeded at a good pace, and two formal dedication services were held on April 16, 1961 to celebrate the completion of the new church building.

Trinity's Pastor Rev. Hilton E. Grams and guest speakers Rev. Dr. Louis Goebel (former President of the Evangelical & Reformed Church), Rev. Dr. Paul Kehle (President of the South Wisconsin Synod), and Rev. Walter Waeckerle (former pastor at Trinity) presided. After the dedication Sunday, numerous other activities including a Dedication Banquet, Youth Sunday, Dedication of Memorials and Gifts service, Confirmation Class Reunion, and other special gatherings, meetings, and luncheons took place. It was one busy month, but it must have been very satisfying and exciting remember that it had taken almost five years from the starting point.



Mikey Hetzel has come on board to assist us as our sound tech and has provided invaluable presence and skill to this task. You'll notice the difference in the sounds of worship.







Commitment: One Sunday, rotation every 4 to 6 weeks


