

"after the comma" Pens and Pencils

Are you a pen or a pencil kind of person? For years pencils were my go-to. Writing papers, notes, cards song lyrics, the pencil allowed for mistakes to be made, then quickly erased. Even mentioning this now, I had many pencils where the erasers were worn down to the metal "ferule" (I had to look that one up...who knew what it was actually called...see below!



One of the other therapeutic things about a pencil is as it is being used, it loses it's sharp point and also depletes it's available lead- which then creates a pause in the activity as I would need to sharpen the pencil, to which once at the appropriate turning of wood and lead against a sharpening object- usually metal, it was ready once again to relate my thoughts, dreams and doodles. Yes, the pencil has the power of translation and transference if teamed with a willing partner (me or you) to inform others about where we are. Brilliant! The modern pencil was invented in 1795 by Nicholas-Jacques Conte who was a scientist serving in Napoleon's army. The premise is a pigment in a casing (wood) which keeps this core from breaking and marking up the users' hands and fingers. Dragging the core pigment across a lightly abrasive surface (paper, etc.) would leave a trail transferring language and thoughts for another's use or for sharing. I confess I write with a heavy touch and break the lead often and have also learned I cannot use mechanical pencils to this day!

The problem was that wonderful eraser. Because you could "remove" the writing, the mistakes, it becomes somewhat unreliable as a "source" document because you could change and manipulate after the initial original writing or drawing. Good and bad you may say. There was inevitably doubt of the validity of the document.



Needing to make a more permanent situation, the pen was introduced. In 1827 Romanian Inventor Petrache Poenaru- created the fountain pen. Pen had been around since 3200 BC using reeds and bamboo and transferred various inks onto surface even walls and bodies. Yes, the ink was the key to a permanent document, but didn't have the ease of changing mistakes in a easy and clean way. The fountain pen eventually replaced the reed and quill versions and ultimately the ballpoint pen replaced the fountain pen. I must admit, I am now more of a pen fan based on the smoother way it writes, and the permanence it makes.

Both pens and pencils are worthy of our admiration, and both provide us with an ability to write as we wish. We also realize the words and pictures derived from the partnership of human thought and creativity can also be used as armaments. Some of the most wonderful things about these instruments are the ability to lift others up, warn them of situations, entertain and create instructions and exclaim words of love and care. The other side is where they can be used to bring others down, chastise, chronicle others faults and proliferate hate. In one instance the ability to erase would be wonderful and can be a symbol of forgiveness- hence the wonder of a pencil. Contrary- the pen can highlight our imperfections and emblazon our mistakes (or others – "the pen is mightier than the sword") but could also solidify the thoughts and conversations exclaiming that same love and care with emphasis. Pencils are usually not allowed for signing an official document or contract, where a pen is preferred because of its permanence.

In weighing the importance and the use of these common tools of our lives, my challenge is to allow for each to have their place in my life. There are sometimes when I need the forgiveness of the pencil to allow me the freedom to make mistakes, try again and pursue my best. In this way I am witnessing to my human frailty and need for forgiveness. The pen allows me to boldly move forward and accept those things which I stumble on and may need to correct but challenges me to think a bit more before I "speak or write". In our lives in living the Way, I believe Jesus asks us to use both pencil and pen. We will make mistakes, and some may not be so easily corrected, but our God through grace encourages us to keep communicating, to keep our options open and not be afraid to let our voices carry from our hearts. You could also say the paper upon which we write is the world waiting for our response to our gifts of love and creation. I know...lots to think about, lots to write about. Don't even get me started on typewriters versus computers...oh Lord!

Dear God, we rejoice in your allowing us to be in conversation with you, knowing your will is for us to be "the Word" in the world with all the tools we have. Amen.



David and Goliath Crossword


