Out On the Way

We just cancelled our Thanksgiving and Christmas plans with our families. The whole thing feels unthinkable. How can we not be together on these special 'holy-days'? After all, of all the things that seem most important to us, family most often ranks the highest. It's easy to fall into a kind of despair or even anger at this turn of events and the pandemic that causes us to even consider shutting down family time.

We've now entered the ninth month of this new routine. We are getting impatient for it to end; tired of the disconnection; frustrated with one more thing we can't do as we normally would do. We're weary of the separations and the joys of ordinary things we took for granted. Simply put....we're done!

Few of us have ever really entered this season of Advent in the way it is meant to be entered. We entered busy and full of plans for Christmas – the presents, the baking, the entertaining, the decorating. We weren't really waiting for anything...we were full of our own plans.

But on that first Christmas, the people had been waiting – for over 400 years, from some word from God. Their lives for many years, had been one of suffering and struggling and slowly coming to accept that they could not force God's blessing, but had to wait. I think of all the people around the world who are waiting for peace, for a sign of hope, for a word of love, a moment of joy; people who have been waiting and waiting,

in the midst of famine, war, poverty, oppression. We are a world waiting. And sometimes, we get weary.

Advent in the life of the church was a way to bring meaning to these



times of waiting – and to find in the waiting, new gifts of hope and joy. Continued on Page 3

Out On the Way

Hope was no longer in external things, but in the awareness that we can find God, even in the harshest circumstances; even in the times of great darkness. They learned to look for small moments of joy rather than great moments of ease and happiness. They learned, as Terry Allen wrote, 'to celebrate the holiness of life' even when there is no holly!

It takes a different kind of energy and imagination to remain hopeful in the darkness, and this is what the stories of Advent tell us. Adventus means 'the arrival.' We believe that Jesus 'arrives' many times over and that the second coming is not simply one event, but that Jesus arrives unexpectedly and in the guise of a child, or a servant many times over. Jesus is always arriving, for those who are prepared, those who have done the hard work of staying awake when it was easier to fall back to sleep. Jesus is always arriving if you've learned to walk in the dark by faith and not by sight. God is always sending the light – even if it's only a small glimpse. Not enough to see by, but enough to give us hope.

This year, I'll be speaking about the messages of the angels in the Christmas story and the scriptures. These messages, are central to this time of Advent, for they provide us a star to follow when other things fail us. I am praying that this Advent may become a New Adventure for you – a time to look up and see if you can see a star; to look around and discover hope and joy in small places. The times of waiting are moments to give us time to prepare for the gift that changes everything, the arrival of Jesus to the world.

A few suggestions: for Communion Sunday, set a table with bread and cup for yourself and those with you; also place a candle on the table during Advent, or if you are lighting your own Advent wreath, light the 3rd candle. (It's easy to make a wreath of some greens and candles – purple and pink or blue and pink!) You'll need 5 candles – one white for the Christ candle. You may also put some decoration on your table that reminds you of the Christ story, a creche, an ornament, a piece of music, the Bible.

For Christmas Eve, I invite you to have candles ready to light as we share the passing of the light! Please make sure they are protected to keep you and yours safe!

On the 27th, or really any Sunday, adding the ringing of some bells to the carols would greatly enhance your joy and laughter!

May it allow you to enjoy reading those Christmas cards you receive instead of just looking at the signature and then putting them aside as decoration. Make those special phone calls to friends near and far and be able to spend the time really catching up. Not running around for the next four weeks may be the biggest blessing of all because it will force all of us to slow down and truly enjoy this very special time of year.
