

Through our last year, we found that there were many things that we could do as a community, many things that God called us to witness to, how our following in the way of Jesus Christ could guide us with the framework needed for loving all of creation.

The Apostle Paul wrote many renewal messages to the church communities knowing that what the people needed to understand was that the work of love is never ending and can grind us down with the rough surfaces of the world burnishing our souls.

In Colossians 3:9-11 he wrote; ⁹ Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices ¹⁰ and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. ¹¹ Here there is no Gentile or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all.

Our experience of this will be helped with readings from Luke and John this month. We will experience the Baptism of Jesus and the new way leading to God through Jesus as he begins his ministry.

Yes, we have many things still to mourn and lament and we will explore these as we approach Ash Wednesday and Lent, but in the meantime...we begin again. This time of Epiphany is as much about the coming of Christ to the world as it is our being ready and willing to be in renewal with Him. We too are living into our Baptism just as we heard in Paul's letter to Titus,

He saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, (Titus 3:5).

We begin this year open to the possibilities and the responsibilities as Christ's body in the world. I found this writing from British Author Neil Gaiman, which gave to me some things to remember for how we boldly move into 2022. We won't be perfect, but we can continue to do good.

"I hope that in this year to come, you make mistakes.

Because if you are making mistakes, then you are making new things, trying new things, learning, living, pushing yourself, changing yourself, changing your world. You're doing things you've never done before, and more importantly, you're Doing Something.

So that's my wish for you, and all of us, and my wish for myself. Make New Mistakes. Make glorious, amazing mistakes. Make mistakes nobody's ever made before. Don't freeze, don't stop, don't worry that it isn't good enough, or it isn't perfect, whatever it is: art, or love, or work or family or life. Whatever it is you're scared of doing, Do it.

Make your mistakes, next year and forever."- Neil Gaiman

Yes, what a year we had, but what a new year we can do!

May God bring Peace, Hope, Joy and Love into our lives, renewing us and rejuvenating us for the work of love we are called to be.





Missions

Due to the great response from the Trinity congregation during the last four months of 2021, the Mission Committee supported four successful months of Mission events.

September event was the school supplies that went to the Women's Center in Waukesha. The fall clothing drive began in September, and money was sent to the Haiti Relief Fund and to Hurricane Ida Relief Fund.

In October, the clothing drive picked up speed and the food basket for the Waukesha Food pantry filled up quickly. Talking about the Waukesha Food Pantry, our harvest in-gathering for Thanksgiving baskets began in October.



Happy New Year -

Hope you had a fun Christmas and enjoyed last month's story and activity. We are continuing with the Christmas story about the Kings visiting Jesus and what happens after.

The Christmas Story continues....


So the wise men went home another way so that Herod would not know where they had come from. They also decided that they would not tell King Herod anything about what they had seen.
